STRIDES TOWARDS RECOVERY

SUMMARY

San Antonio International Airport (SAT)'s passenger numbers reached 584,247 in February 2022 representing a 157.2% increase compared to the same month in 2021.

February is historically a slower time of year for air travel demand especially in the leisure sector as most people have just traveled for the holidays and will again in March or April for Spring Break. The historically slow travel period combined with the continuation of rising cases of COVID-19 in San Antonio and around the world due to the Omicron variant, resulted in lower passenger numbers and a continued slow recovery of business travel demand. Although domestic passenger numbers continue to remain below pre-pandemic levels, SAT's international passenger numbers continue to outperform numbers seen in 2019 even as the land border between the U.S. and Mexico had reopened.

As we monitor our recovery, we continue to compare our monthly numbers to the same month pre-pandemic in 2019. In February, passenger numbers reached 82.7% of the levels seen during February 2019 while total capacity reached 87.4% seen during that month.

Additionally, a total of 20,931,992 pounds of air cargo moved through SAT during the month, representing a 23.9% increase compared to February 2021, and in line with the levels seen during 2019.

DOMESTIC PASSENGERS

SAT continues to compare passenger numbers to 2019 levels to better understand and monitor the recovery. Total scheduled domestic capacity, or seats, were at 85.4% of what was flown in February 2019.

Multiple routes from SAT saw increases in both capacity and frequency in February 2022 compared to January 2022. These routes include Atlanta (ATL), Chicago (MDW), El Paso (ELP), and San Diego (SAN) on Southwest Airlines (WN), Newark (EWR), Houston (IAH), and Washington (IAD) on United Airlines (UA), and Chicago (ORD) and Phoenix (PHX) on American Airlines (AA).

Some of the airlines serving SAT continued to experience operational difficulties during the month of February due to crew and aircraft constraints including American Airlines (AA). As result, service network-wide, including SAT, was reduced which can be seen in the chart below.

INTERNATIONAL PASSENGERS

An impressive increase in both international capacity and passengers to and from SAT has helped recovery at the airport. SAT's scheduled international capacity increased by 28.4% when compared to February 2019 while international passenger numbers increased by 24.1%.

February also represents a slower travel period to Mexico being between the busy holiday travel period and the Spring which includes both Holy Week and Spring Break. Reductions in capacity by all Mexican carriers resulted in total seats being down 38.9% compared to January 2022 but still well above 2019 levels as indicated above.

SAT ranked #2 among all U.S. medium-hub airports in terms of total seats to Mexico for February only behind Houston (HOU). When looking at all U.S. airports, SAT ranked #18 between Las Vegas (LAS) and Salt Lake City (SLC). In terms of total international seats, SAT ranked #31 out of all 70 U.S. airports that had international service during February.

Upcoming Changes

Southwest Airlines (WN) will begin **<u>new</u>**, <u>**nonstop**</u> service to Oklahoma City (OKC) on April 3rd. Service will be 6x weekly operating all days besides Saturdays.

In May, American Airlines (AA) will add an additional frequency on nonstop service to Miami (MIA). This will bring service from SAT to twice daily giving travelers more options to South Florida and beyond to the airline's extensive Caribbean and Latin American network.

Sun Country (SY) will resume seasonal service to both Minneapolis-St. Paul (MSP) on May 20th and Cancun (CUN) on May 27th. Service to Cancun which started last year at twice weekly will increase to 4x weekly through the summer.

Frontier Airlines (F9) will launch new, nonstop service twice weekly to Atlanta (ATL) on May 26th and 3x weekly service to Philadelphia (PHL) on June 17th.

Starting in June, United Airlines (UA) will increase capacity on their popular San Francisco (SFO) route. Currently served on a regional E-175 with 76 seats, the daily flight will switch to a mix of A319 and B737-800 aircraft representing an increase of 70% more seats daily to the Bay Area.

Operated 5x weekly last summer, Southwest Airlines (WN) will increase service to daily on their Cancun (CUN) nonstops.

Previously operated around the holidays, Southwest Airlines (WN) will start <u>new</u> Saturday service to Albuquerque (ABQ) on June 11th operated through the summer. While service is less than daily, Southwest (WN) often tests the viability of new markets by offering a limited schedule. If initial performance is positive, additional frequency is likely.

Delta Air Lines (DL) is scheduled to resume nonstop service to New York (JFK) on September 13th. For those looking to fly to New York, nonstop service is currently being offered by JetBlue Airways (B6) and United Airlines (UA).
